Litigated Claims Update

CLAIMS LITIGATION - 2022 YEAR TO DATE (January 1, 2022 - September 30, 2022)

Overview of Incoming Lawsuits and Pending Volume:

From January 2022 through September 2022, Citizens was served with 9,378 lawsuits (9,280 Residential Property, 34 Commercial Property and 64 Liability) – averaging 1,042 new lawsuits per month. This reflects a 19% increase in the number of new incoming suits per month as compared to this same time period last year (2021 average for January through September – 878).

As of September 30, 2022, current pending volume totaled 20,376 lawsuits (20,092 Residential Property, 176 Commercial Property and 108 Liability). This reflects a 25% increase in pending as compared to the same time last year (16,240 pending matters).




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77% of the incoming Residential Property lawsuits arise out of the Tri-County area. This represents an 8% decrease in the distribution of Lawsuits originating from the Tri-County area, primarily due to the increasing distribution arising out of the Central West area.





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The plaintiff was represented at First Notice of Loss in 38% of incoming residential property lawsuits. This represents an 18% decrease as compared to 2021:

- Public Adjuster 25%
- Attorney 13%
- Both PA & Attorney <1%





11% of the incoming Residential Property lawsuits the insured did not dispute Citizens' position or adjustment of the claim prior to filing suit which represents a 63% decrease compared to 2021. This is the expected and intended effect of the Notice of Intent statute. We anticipate this will continue to decline over time as the statute now applies to all current and active policies.




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A review of the timing of incoming lawsuits reveals that 29% of lawsuits are brought within 6 months of the First Notice of Loss (FNOL). This is a 12% decrease compared to 2021. This is the historical trend in the absence of a recent catastrophe (please note that the timespan of this report does not include litigation arising out of Hurricane lan).

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
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Water Loss, AOB and CAT:

New incoming CAT lawsuits have decreased by 10%, now representing 40% of all new incoming lawsuits. Pending CAT lawsuits remain at 48% of all pending lawsuits as of September 30, 2022 and continues to be the leading cause of loss in pending lawsuits. Please note that the timespan of this report does not include litigation arising out of Hurricane lan.

AOB Lawsuits, however, have increased by 100%, now representing 47% of all new incoming lawsuits making AOB the leading lawsuit type for new incoming lawsuits. Pending AOB lawsuits have also increased, by 67%, now representing 36%, as compared to 27% January through September 2021.


Non-Weather Water (NWW) Lawsuits represent 19% of all new incoming, a 4% decrease and 21% of all pending, an 9% increase compared to the same time period in 2021.





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CONCLUSION

As of this date, we have not been served with any lawsuits arising out of Hurricane Ian. The information above reflects trending prior to Hurricane Ian.

AOB lawsuits have continued to trend up and amount to the leading type of new, incoming lawsuit from January through September of this year. CAT lawsuits are the second leading type of new, incoming litigation with NWW as third leading type.

While we continue to see the vast majority of litigation arising out of the Tri-County area, other areas of the state (particularly the Central West region) are steadily trending upward in the distribution of litigation.

We continue to experience the benefits of the Notice of Intent statute, particularly the rapidly declining trend in lawsuits filed without any notice of dispute by the insured prior to filing suit.

Overall, we continue to experience a rising trend in new litigation as compared to prior years. This trend is expected to continue to increase in light of the potential litigation that may arise out of Hurricane Ian.
